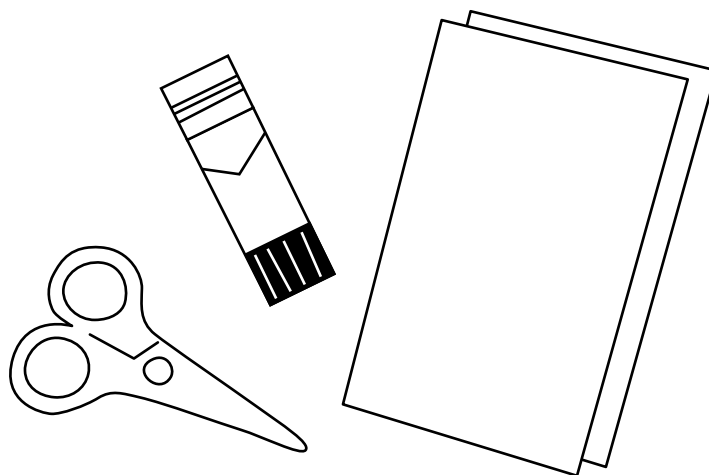
Ages: 9+

Unfortunately, some
pieces went missing.”

Number One, and this is
how I am displayed in the
museum today.”

The birch bark
containers look like
cylindrical boxes and
are about 20 cm tall.
The slightly oval-shaped
base has a diameter of
about 15 – 18 cm.

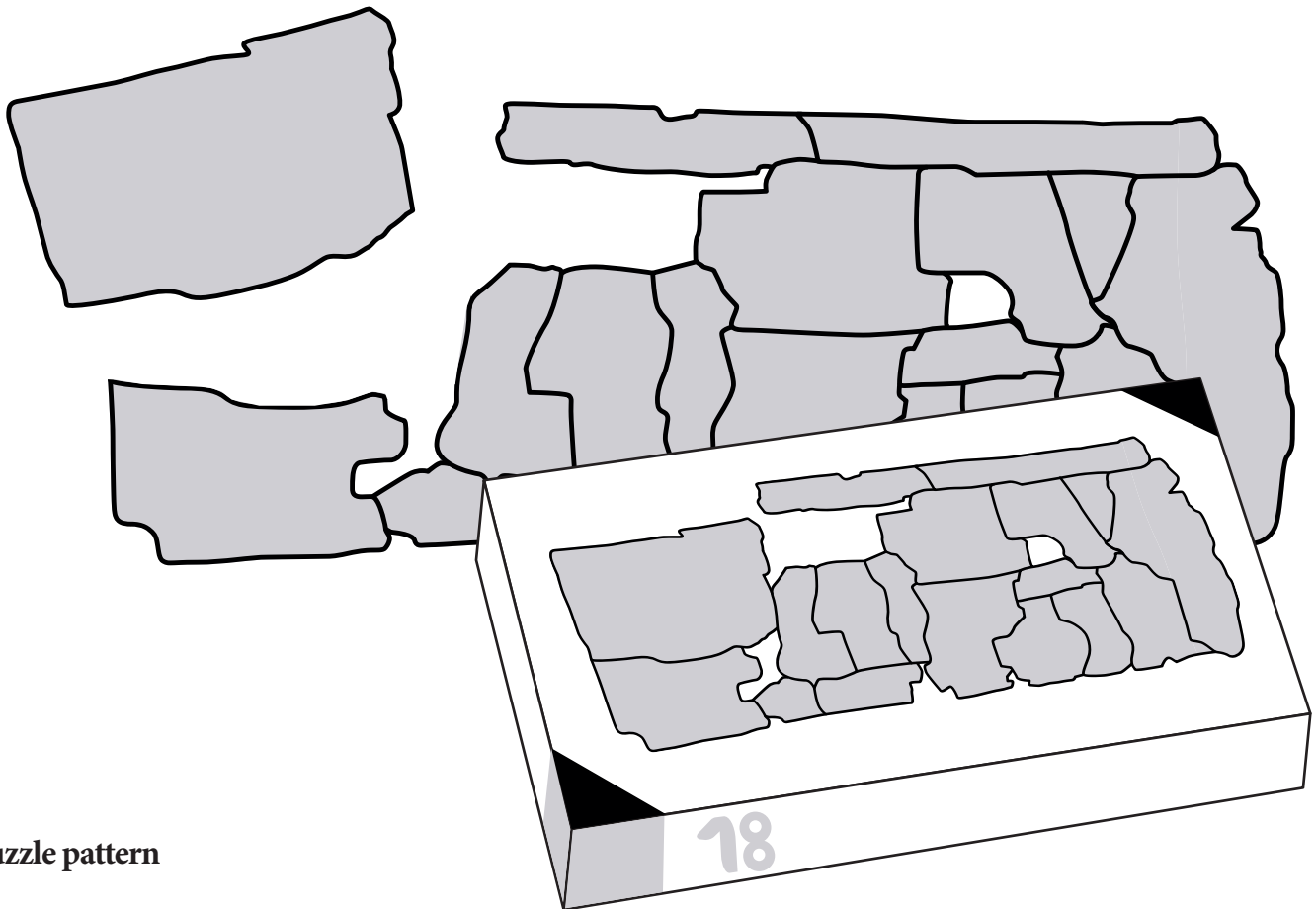

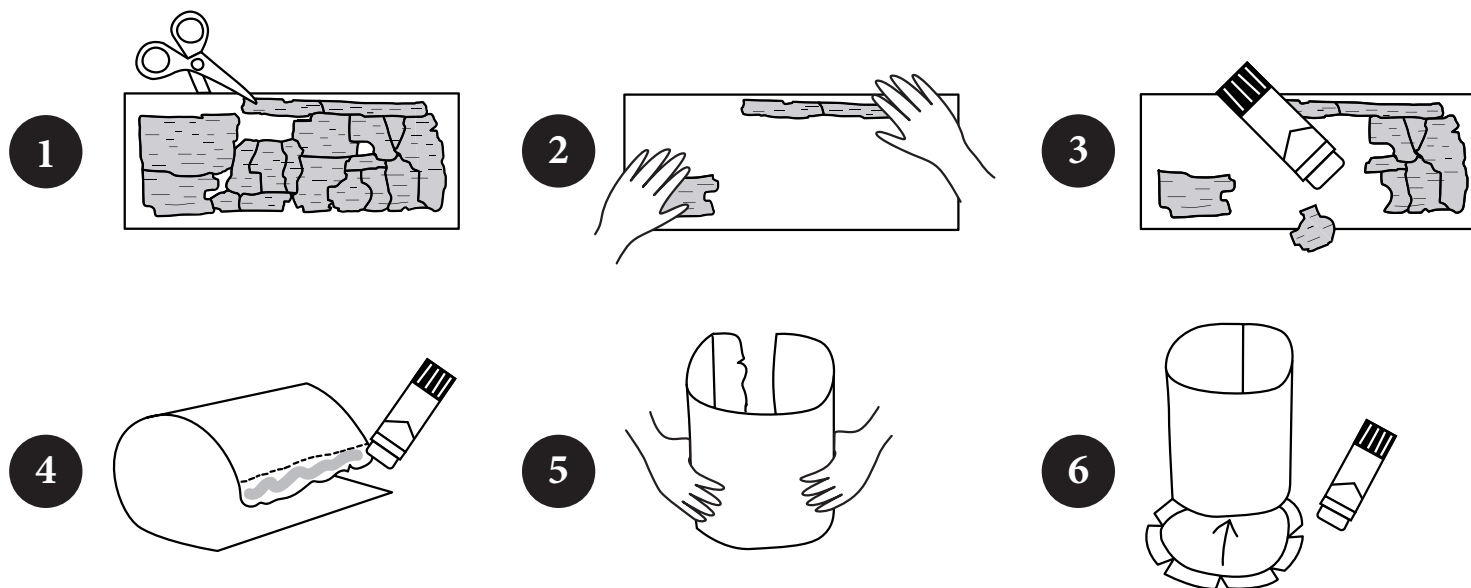


It isn't easy

Puzzle pattern

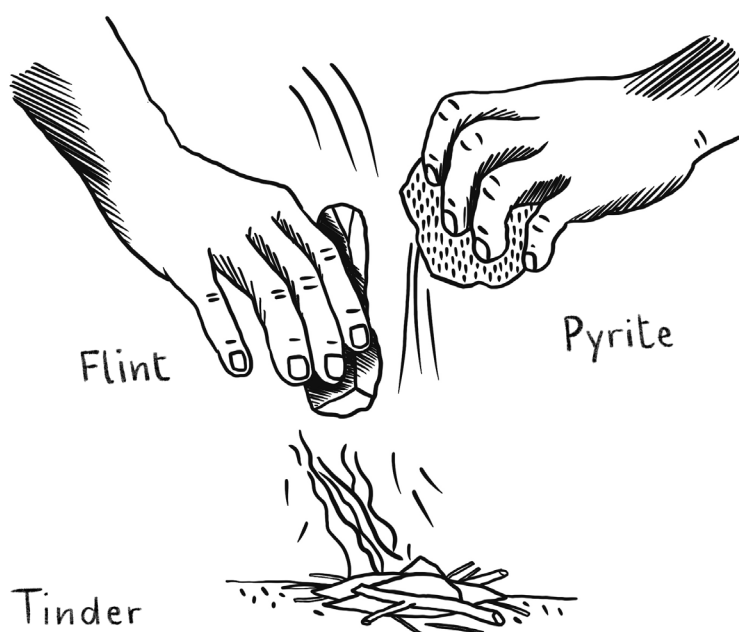

Ötzi carried glowing charcoal in the second container. He wrapped it in fresh maple leaves so it would still be glowing after several hours. This makes it quite easy to start a fire quickly. Without embers you must start a fire with pyrite, flint, and tinder. This is no easy task if the weather is wet or windy...
