MINIATURE MUSEUM


Ages: 7+





Workshop Instructions

Build your own tiny museum. You can use a box that already has dividers, such as a chocolate box, or you can use any box you prefer and build your own dividers.





How many subjects do you need? To create room dividers, use scissors to cut thin cardboard or sturdy paper into pieces and place them in the box. Then, of course, you will need many things to fill your miniature museum.

Invite other people to visit your museum. Tell them the history of these things, or a story in which these things appear. Oh yes, one more thing: every museum has a name.


A museum isn't just a place for things


