
### ÖTZI'S WORLD IS FULL OF NOISES AND SOUNDS

#### Hello!

What noises and sounds have you heard today? Maybe birds chirping, an alarm clock ringing, cars driving by, leaves rustling...

Our ears detect noises and sounds. That is what we call hearing. Everything we hear is actually vibrating air. These air vibrations are also called sound waves. In order to hear something, sound waves need to make our eardrums vibrate.

Sound waves can do that: They spread through the air.

But our ears can do much more! Our sense of balance also has to do with our ears. They help us to keep our balance, e.g., when we stand on one leg. Give it a try!


How do people speak if they cannot hear? Deaf people speak their own language: Sign language. It works with the help of hands, facial expressions, and mouth movements.




Instructions for the matching game "Ötzi's world is full of noises and sounds"

#### **Imagine:**

People were already making music more than 40,000 years ago. We know this because archaeologists have found fragments of flutes. These are the oldest musical instruments and were carved from swan and griffon vulture bones or from mammoth ivory by people who lived in caves in the Ice Age. People have probably always enjoyed singing, playing musical instruments, and dancing together.
